

WHAT TO EXPECT AFTER A FILLING APPOINTMENT

- You can eat and drink normally right after the appointment, be careful not to bite your numb lip, cheek or tongue. Avoid foods that are extreme in temperature.
- The filling(s) may feel rough for a few days. The finished filling(s) may be contoured slightly different and have a different texture than the original tooth. This is due to your tongue noticing the changes but will begin to adapt to the new additions
- Continue to brush and floss your teeth as usual. The filling(s) will become smoother as you continue to brush.
- **Gum Tenderness is to be expected** but we encourage you to brush and floss the areas as you normally would.
- Sensitivity to hot and cold substances is not uncommon. Sensitivity may be increased if the decay or preparation was deep or close to the nerve. If the tooth is responding and healing, sensitivity only lasts for a short time after the cold is introduced and does not linger. Gradually over time thermal sensitivity decreases as the tooth develops a healed, protective layer. It is not uncommon for this minor sensitivity to last for up to 4 weeks. If symptoms persist without improvement please contact our office as further treatment may be necessary.
- Pain might be experienced due to muscle tightness or tenderness following operative procedures, especially at the site of the injection. Common remedies would be over the counter anti-inflammatory pain medication such as Advil, Motrin or Ibuprofen.
- While you are numb, we check your bite to make sure you are not hitting on the filling(s) first; however you might have difficulty "feeling" if your bite is correct because the sensation is skewed.

<u>IMPORTANT:</u> If a filling feels "HIGH", all your teeth do not touch when you bite closed or you are having PAIN WHILE CHEWING please contact us within a few days of your appointment for a slight adjustment on the filling(s).

DO NOT WAIT in hopes that it will settle down. The longer you wait the more pain you will experience.
